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
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## Welcome New Members

### Tips for fall yard maintenance

The leaves have started to fall again and many of us have found our lawns covered in the colours of autumn. Yet pretty soon, we will be pulling out our blowers and rakes and those leaf covered lawns will turn to curbsides lined with brown paper bags. What many of us don't know is just how important these leaves can be, not only for our lawns but for the environment. This fall, LCN is asking the community to leave leaves alone! Over the winter months, fallen leaves can help shield smaller wildlife such as chipmunks from the cold, and may also provide an important source of shelter for overwintering insects. Moreover, leaves can also act as a fantastic natural fertilizer for our lawns and gardens! For example, mulching leaves can help improve soil structure and water retention, and mulch mowing helps encourage healthier lawns as it allows grass roots to penetrate deeper into the soil! ## Species-at-Risk Bat & Gray Ratsnake Project

Over the last few months, we have been conducting the research portion of our Species-at-risk project for endangered bats! We have had an amazing turnout of volunteers who dedicated many of their evenings to assist with collecting acoustic and observational data for bats in Niagara.



Staff and volunteers surveyed every night from August 23 to the end of October at four different sites to determine if bats are using these areas for overwintering habitat. All data collected will be sent to Toby Thorne at the Toronto Zoo for analysis. We are looking forward to seeing the results this Winter! # Species-at-Risk Bat & Gray Ratsnake Project

We are so excited to have partnered with Niagara College students in the Ecosystem Restoration Program to conduct this research! The students will be monitoring one of our candidate locations as part of their graduate studies. They will be providing us with their data for our project. We had a great time setting up equipment, and monitoring bats in person using handheld ultrasonic devices to collect additional data at the site.


This pamphlet has information about all 8 Ontario bat species including all 4 Speciesat-Risk and some of the threats to these species. Take a sneak peak!

## Tree Planting Event

### Tree Planting Event with the City of Niagara Falls

Land Care Niagara participated in a tree-planting event with the City of Niagara Falls and donated 30 trees at cost. During this planting event, volunteers planted rows of native tree species such as Hackberry, Red Maple, White Pine, and Eastern Redbud as part of ongoing efforts to expand the city's urban canopy with 170 new trees. This work was made possible through a partnership with Tree Canada, a national tree-planting charity, and the CN Eco-Connexions From the Ground Up initiative.
